

Public Art Scavenger Hunt: Route 2

You're on a quest to find 17 pieces of public art in east Orangeville. Follow this two-kilometre route to admire tree sculptures and utility boxes while you solve the clues for each piece.



Route: Start in downtown Orangeville, across from Town Hall at 87 Broadway. Head east along Broadway to find a collection of pieces located at the Sherbourne Street intersection. Head north and continue along Second Avenue to First Street. Explore the pieces here before heading south back to Broadway. After a short detour west to John Street, cross Broadway and head east back to Town Hall. **Find the route online here: <https://bit.ly/publicartroute2>**

Things to know:

- The clues are in order of appearance, but some are slightly off the exact route. Keep watch along the way.
- The route is all outdoors and can be done at any time. Make sure to dress for the weather.
- The entire route travels along sidewalks and paved paths, making it an easy stroll for all participants

What is the last name of the two artists who created the piece? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #2: On the ropes As you go east on Broadway, keep your guard up when you meet the next tree sculpture. The Boxer is ready to fight! Don't throw in the towel until you snap a photo in your best boxing stance. Share @orangevilletourism</p>	<p>Clue #3: What a hoot! Find an owl in a tree, sitting on the side of Broadway. The owl was crafted separately from the rest of the sculpture. No wonder he is holding on tight! How many talons are on each foot? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #4: Twist and shout At Sherbourne Street, find a carving of a woman. She was created by the first female artist featured in the tree sculpture program. Can you guess the name of the sculpture? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #5: Hot stuff The Dragon Timber may not be breathing fire, but the intricacy of the carving is breath taking. Admire his scales, wings, and claws and then pose with the beast for a striking photo. Share @orangevilletourism</p>
<p>Clue #6: Whole wide world Inclusive, a tree sculpture located on the northeast corner, depicts a group of people with different levels of ability reaching up to a globe. How many people are shown? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #7: Get mooooo-ving A utility box called Dufferin Bovines celebrates the County's agricultural roots. There are seven cows in the artwork. How many are lying down? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Sherbourne Street becomes Second Avenue at Rotary Park. Take some time to play or rest at the park before continuing along Second Avenue. The next collection of public art awaits you at First Street.</p>		<p>Clue #8: A history of care The Nurse stands in front of the former location of the Dufferin Area Hospital, wearing a uniform from the early 1900s. The sculpture marked a special anniversary for the local chapter of the IODE. In what year did it celebrate 100 years of care for the community? Answer: _____</p>
<p>Clue #9: Uplifting "Helping Hands and Caring Hearts" pays tribute to another nurse, Erna Baniulis. The sculpture was created to honour her 90th birthday. How many hearts are shown in between the two hands? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #10: Horsing around Artist Ellen Cameron created the image of Clydesdale horses displayed on the utility box at this corner. How many horses are shown working in the snow-covered field? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #11: Fit for a prince The Prince of Wales tree sculpture overlooks First Street, a route that was formerly called Prince of Wales Road. Looking dapper in a three-piece suit, what is the prince leaning on? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #12: High flyer Take a detour west on Broadway to find a utility box showcasing many of the community's key buildings and monuments. What is flying from the top of the Dufferin County Court House building? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #13: Howl at the moon Cross the street and turn east. The tree sculpture in front of the post office is one of the newest additions to the collection and features a group of four coyotes. How many are howling? Answer: _____</p>
<p>Clue #14: The thrill is gone The utility box installed at the intersection of Broadway and First Street is a tribute to the Orangeville Blues & Jazz Festival. What artist is shown in the artwork? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #15: Once upon a time The Storyteller tree sculpture honours Marilyn Doekes, a dedicated teacher and librarian. Read her story on the plaque to her right. What business did she found? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #16: Out for a ride Across from Town Hall, a utility box shows a fun-loving bovine going for a ride through the countryside. The driver is wearing a tie. What colour is it? Answer: _____</p>	<p>Clue #17: Standing proud Look! A lion! But is there just one? Look high and low. What is the total number of lions carved into this tree sculpture? Answer: _____</p>	<p>You've completed your quest, but the adventure isn't over! While you're here, explore downtown Orangeville and discover a unique selection of local shops and restaurants.</p>
